


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Digital tech—transforming the way we connect

If you're like me, then your parents like to remind you how different life was back in their day. They say my generation is spoiled because we have everything at our fingertips, that it's so easy to share information and keep in touch. In our parents' time, they called home from landlines to make plans and left messages on answering machines if no one was home. Our generation has never known a world without the internet and smartphones, which got me thinking: how has digital tech changed the way we connect?

Digital hangouts
Twenty-five years ago, I spent time with these friends in playgrounds, libraries or shopping malls. When they hung out, they chatted, gossiped and joked with each other. I'm sure today often socialize digitally, meeting up and talking on social networking sites or apps. Today's teens might not physically hang out as often as they did 25 years ago, but they are sharing just as much online—maybe even more than people do face to face. There is a perception among teens that if you're not hanging out in the digital world, you're not cool. You're out of the social circle. Ninety per cent of teens have social media accounts, so it's not totally clear if they feel it or feel pressure to take part. Some people think this digital connectivity means that teenagers are more socially connected than their parents' generation was, but recent research suggests that connecting digitally actually isolates young people.

If we don't use digital communication, whether it's texts, chats, IMs or email, we won't survive in the working world. The same is true for the companies we work for. The power is in our hands
In January 2017, a Women's March took place in cities around the world from Buenos Aires to Melbourne. Two million people took part in the march for issues such as equality, healthcare and the environment. How were people around the world able to organise an event so big? Through digital technology, of course. Before digital technology, organising a worldwide event like this was extremely difficult. Not only do we now have the power to connect to people globally, but we also have the power to become citizen journalists at these events. Today, average people are reporting the news as much as professional journalists. If a major event occurs, we rely on the average person to video it or blog about it.

Through digital tech like the smartphone in my pocket right now, we have the power to share information, ideas and knowledge. Some people (I'm talking about you, Mum!) argue that we have too much information now. They argue that we can't tell the difference between what is real and what is fake. These people say digital tech distracts us, that we're watching cat videos instead of doing something meaningful. Some people may think this, but I argue that more information is better: if people share, we will learn and understand our societies and cultures better.

The world has undoubtedly changed since digital technology has become a part of everyday life. Our parents might think we're spoiled, but one thing is clear: we are a much more connected planet, for better or worse.
