King's College

The King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge, founded in 1441 by Henry VI.

King's chapel is regarded as one of the greatest examples of late Gothic English architecture. It was built over a period of a hundred years

(1446–1531) in three stages. King's offers all undergraduate courses available at the University. The building is seen as emblematic of Cambridge. In general, the atmosphere at King's is considered to be a little easier than that of other colleges to integrate into if you come from a working class or minority background.







Front Court

The Chapel is widely seen as a symbol of Cambridge, as seen in the logo of the city council.



Peterhouse

Peterhouse is the oldest college of the University, having been founded in 1284 by Hugo de Balsham, Bishop of Ely. The buildings date from a wide variety of times, and have been much altered over the years.

Viewed from the main entrance to Peterhouse on Trumpington Street, the altar end of the Chapel is the most immediately visible building. The Chapel was built in 1628 when the Master of the time Matthew Wren (Christopher Wren's uncle) demolished the college's original hostels.

SCR: *The Senior Combination Room. A public lounge/common room for the senior members of a Cambridge college.*





























Trinity College

- 700 undergraduates,
- 430 graduates
- 170 fellows
- *In the 20th century, members of Trinity won 31 Nobel Prizes*
- *Trinity is one of Cambridge University's three royal colleges, along with King's and St John's.*
- *it is the largest college in either Oxford or Cambridge. In terms of student numbers, it is second to Homerton College, Cambridge.*
- *Trinity admitted its first woman graduate student in 1976 and its first woman undergraduate in 1978, and appointed its first female fellow in 1977.*

Newnham College

- *women-only constituent college of the University of Cambridge.*
- *was founded in 1871 by Henry Sidgwick*
- *was the second Cambridge college to admit women after Girton College.*
- *The college has two official combination rooms that represent the interests of students in the college and are responsible for social aspects of college life. Undergraduates are members of the Junior Combination Room (JCR), whilst graduate students are members of the Middle Combination Room (MCR) + there is the SCR (Senior Combination Room) for the teaching staff.*

The full formal name of the college is "The Master, Fellows and Scholars of the College of St John the Evangelist in the University of Cambridge".

The aims of the College, as specified by its Statutes, are the promotion of education, religion, learning and research.

Corpus Clock

The dominating visual feature of the clock is a grim-looking metal sculpture of an insect similar to a grasshopper or locust.

The **Corpus Clock** is a large sculptural clock at street level on the outside of the Taylor Library at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge University. It was conceived and funded by John C. Taylor, an old member of the college.
